

NOT SO SCARY BUGS

BUGS I CAN DISCOVER AND TOUCH

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Sometimes bugs seem scary.

They might have big eyes, or hairy legs, or parts that look like they will pinch or sting.



But some bugs are safe to touch if you hold them carefully.

If you are afraid to hold them, you can still look at them. Bugs are very interesting creatures.



Mantis

A mantis is sometimes called a "praying mantis" because of the way it holds its front legs. It hunts and eats other insects like crickets and grashoppers, but it will even eat a hummingbird if it can catch one. They are safe to touch if you are very careful.



Ladybug (Ladybird beetle)

Ladybugs are very helpful. They eat other bugs that ruin flowers and other plants that we eat. Ladybugs are colorful. The bright color on a ladybug's body warns other bugs: "Don't eat me. I taste icky."



Caterpillar

Bugs can get hurt, or cold, or hungry just like people do, so it's important to be careful with any bugs you touch. If you catch a bug like a caterpillar, you can look at it for a while and then let it go again. A caterpillar will turn into a moth or a butterfly.



Roly poly

Some people call this a potato bug, but scientists will tell you it's not really a bug. It's a crustacean. Some species of roly poly will roll into a ball if they are threatened. If you wait a few seconds, they will unroll and crawl on your fingers or hands.



Katydid

Katydids can hide in trees because they look almost like a leaf. They make a chirping sound at night and some people think it sounds like someone saying, "Katy did, Katy didn't."

Firefly (Lightning bug)

If your are lucky enough to east of the Rocky
Mountains, you might live in a place where you can
see fireflies at night. Not all fireflies flash. Most
species that live west of the Rocky Mountains do not.
You can keep fireflies in a jar for an hour or two to
look at them up-close.
