



Games



Feed the Shark Sorting Game

Materials:
Empty Toilet Paper Rolls
Free Shark Printable
Hot Glue Gun or Tape
Scissors

Directions:

Using the link above, print out the free shark printable. This printable will include colored sharks and colored fish. Using some scissors have you or the children cut out the sharks and the fish (By having the kids cut they can develop their fine motor skills and coordination, plus saves you part of the work). After they are cut out, tape or glue each shark to the top of a toilet paper roll (use the photo for reference). Have the children sort each color of fish and feed them to the shark. This game helps kids with their matching and math skills.



Walk the Plank

Materials: Wooden Plank Blue Tablecloth Cardboard Scissors

Directions:

Place a blue tablecloth on the ground and a wooden plank above it. Using some scissors cut triangles out of cardboard (these will represent shark fins), and cut a slit in the bottom. Using more cardboard, cut a small rectangle and place it in the slit so that the fins stick up. Have the kids walk across the plank without falling into the "shark infested waters" below. This is a great way for kids to practice their balancing skills.

Crafts and Hands on Activities



Shark Suncatcher

Materials:

Free Shark Silhouette Printable

Printable Black Cardstock Paper Dinner Plate

Paper Plate

Different Shades of Blue Tissue Paper

Scissors


White Crayon Clear Contact Paper Tape or glue



Directions:

Trace around the edge of a dinner plate onto a piece of black cardstock paper, then cut the circle out. Place a paper plate into the center of the circle and trace around it, then cut out the center circle, leaving about a half inch of a circle border. Print the free shark silhouette and cut it out. Trace the shark onto the extra cardstock and cut them out. You can use multiple sharks or just one. Cut your colored tissue paper into small squares. Get out your contact paper and using your black border paper, use the outside of the circle to trace onto the contact paper, then cut it out. Peel off the backing and stick it onto your border paper. On the sticky side of the contact paper lay out your tissue paper in different patterns, then place your shark cut outs on top using some tape or glue. Hang your art in a window so the sun can shine through!

Clothespin Shark



Materials:
Clothespin
Grey or Blue, Orange, and White Cardstock Paper
Toothpick
Googly Eye (Optional)
Free Printable Shark Pattern

Directions:

Hot Glue Gun

Start with having your children cut out the shark pattern and trace the top onto blue or grey cardstock, the bottom half of the shark onto white, and the fish onto orange and cut the pieces out. Then cut a toothpick to about an inch in length. Use the hot glue gun (kids are welcome to do this part if they are old enough but closely supervise, or you can do it instead!) to attach the toothpick and the blue shark fin both to the white portion of the sharks body (use the photo as reference to where to place it). At the back of the sharks body glue the paper to a clothespin to where it can still open up and split the shark in the middle. Allow the kids to draw on fins and even an eyeball, or you can glue a googly eye onto the shark.




